

There exists no blueprint that city governments can follow to provide sustainable infrastructure and ensure decent standards of living for slum-dwellers.





Problem

Slums are full of talent and potential, but daily survival struggles often hold people back. Without opportunities, creativity and entrepreneurship take a backseat to simply getting by. Real change takes more than just meeting basic needs like water—it requires tackling the deeper issues of poverty. Too often, well-meaning projects provide essential services **separately and in scattered locations**, creating reliance on aid and adding to **time poverty**. As a result, people are forced to walk long distances to access water, laundry, sanitation, and other services—spending precious hours each day just to meet their basic needs.





That's why our approach is different; it's holistic. Our "community center" model serves as the nucleus of empowerment, with water as the foundation. Our model offers a comprehensive range of essential services in one centralized location. These services are tailored to community needs, from toilets, showers, and energy to internet access, education, job linkages, healthy food, and even a music studio for artistic expression. Moreover, we break the cycle of poverty and foster a shift in mindset by empowering residents through fair charges, promoting ownership and self-reliance. This shift not only encourages self-sufficiency but also enhances financial longevity of the project.

A DECADE OF IMPACT IN KIBERA

In 2024, HNP built its first community center in Kibera, the largest slum in Africa. Prior to designing and constructing the center, the Human Needs Project dedicated four years to engaging community leaders and residents in comprehensive training, equipping them with the necessary skills to operate the center independently and foster community ownership. The Kibera Town Center (HNP Gatwekera) is managed by 30 individuals from Kibera who embody the values of self-pride and independence. We thank everyone who helped make this dream a reality.

CLEAN WATER

The Human Needs Project center is equipped with a commercial-grade filtration system, delivering the highest quality, great-tasting water to the community. We take pride in providing clean, safe water that prevents waterborne diseases, improves health, and fosters socio-economic development.

LAUNDRY

Access to laundry facilities at the Human Needs Project center frees up women's time, allowing them to pursue income opportunities, education, or family time, boosting their empowerment and well-being.

TOILETS & SHOWERS

Clean toilets and showers provide slum residents with the ability to maintain essential hygiene for work while preventing the spread of disease. These facilities help individuals start their day feeling refreshed and confident, empowering them to pursue employment and income opportunities with a strong sense of readiness.

EDUCATION

In the slum, education sparks empowerment and progress. Our programs offer individuals the skills and confidence they need to break free from poverty and build careers in areas such as IT, business, entrepreneurship, graphic design, music, and more.

URBAN FARMING

Our urban farming program empowers residents to grow fresh produce, enhancing food security. With training and support, participants cultivate nutritious crops in small urban spaces, promoting self-sufficiency, environmental sustainability, and income generation.

CAFETERIA

Our cafeteria at the HNP center serves nutritious, affordable meals, offering a healthy alternative to the common unhealthy food options in the slum and promoting better eating habits for residents.













PHASE II

Expanding access to education, safety and economic opportunities with solar streetlights since 2023



In 2019, we partnered with the **Rockefeller Foundation**, which funded the installation of **45 solar streetlights** in Kibera, enhancing safety, education, and economic opportunities. Seeing the impact, the **Livelihood Impact Fund** joined us in 2023 to add **55 more lights**, bringing the total to **100**. The lights were successfully installed last year.

We are proud of this achievement because HNP has always recognized that real change requires more than just one service—it demands investment in infrastructure. Today, over 100,000 residents benefit daily, making Kibera safer and more vibrant.



2024 Highlights

10-Year Anniversary Celebration



In October 2024, we gathered with 200 supporters in San Francisco to celebrate a decade of impact. Expanded Our Urban Farming Program

Our Urban Farming Program continues to thrive! In 2023, we built 30 greenhouses for the Kibera community. This year, responding to the community's growing demand, we were approached by local schools to construct 15 additional greenhouses to improve food security for children.



Launched the Water Bottling Plant



In April, we opened our Water Bottling Plant in Kibera, with **Grundfos** CEO Poul Due Jensen joining us for the ribbon-cutting ceremony. This initiative, along with the debut of our Aqualuxe water brand, represents a major step forward in our pursuit of financial independence.

Invested in Our Team



In 2024, HNP Music Producer Daniel Owino networked with Bay Area producers and trained at LAAMP in Los Angeles. Meantime, our Technical Director Byrones Khainga represented HNP at the World Water Conference in Sweden, gaining insights to advance water technology for poverty alleviation.

Hosted a Community Football Tournament

We brought the Kibera community together like never before through our football tournament, which drew an incredible 10,000 spectators!

The tournament featured 24 male and 8 female teams! Held over three weeks, the tournament included halftime shows by our Music Studio.



Supported Community During Severe Flooding



In April, Nairobi was hit with severe flooding, with slum areas like Kibera impacted the most. We provided emergency assistance to Kibera residents and our team members by rebuilding housing and helping with relocation efforts to ensure their safety and stability.





Launched a Recycling Program


